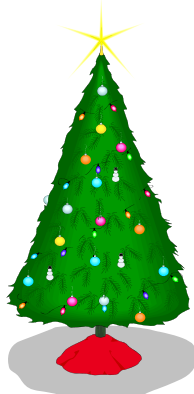

A few updates

Pat was unable to write a column for this issue and I'll let him tell you about his new found respect for current technology on his return in Feb.

In Pat's absence I've put together a few updates he and I had talked about before the last issue. The following little known traffic laws that everyone should remember were provided by the Douglas County Sheriff's office.

With the privilege of driving a vehicle in the State of Colorado also comes the responsibility of the driver to know all the traffic laws. Traffic laws were created to ensure the safety of all those that are on our state's roadways. Many of the traffic laws are very easy to remember; speed limit, seatbelts, stopping at stop signs, etc. The following are some of the common unknown violations that traffic officers see on a daily basis and want to make sure that the driving public is aware of.

Failure to yield right of way to a stationary emergency vehicle: Driver who observes a stationary police, ambulance, or fire vehicle on side of road shall mover over one lane if possible. If it is not possible due to other traffic, driver shall reduce and maintain a safe speed. This statute also applies to maintenance/ repair/ construction vehicles and any stationary vehicle that is being chained up on the side of the road. **The ticket could carry a \$70 fine and up to 4 points.** This has been referred to as the **Move Over Law**.

Minor driver operated a motor vehicle with an unauthorized passenger: When a minor first gets a

(Continued from page 6) Pat's column driver's license they cannot have any friends less than 21 years of age in the car while they are driving for the first 6 months, the second 6 months they can have one friend in the car with them. This excludes siblings and medical emergencies. **The ticket can carry a fine of \$50 and 2 points.**

Motorcycle (operator/passenger) less than 18 years of age not wearing an approved protective helmet: This new law states that anyone under the age of 18 on a motorcycle, whether driver or passenger, must be wearing a helmet. **The ticket can carry a fine of \$100 and 3 points.**

Driving a vehicle without valid driver's license on person: The driver has a valid driver's license, but does not have it on them while operating the vehicle. **This can carry a fine of \$15.**

Television visible to vehicle operator: Driver cannot watch television while driving. You would think this would be common sense, but it is a law for a reason. **Driver could be fined \$35.**

Driving a vehicle while wearing earphones: Driver cannot wear music headphones or ear buds while driving. **Can carry a fine of \$15.**

Failure to notify authorities of change of (name/address) within 30 days: A change of address form (DR 2285) can be obtained on line at www.colorado.gov/revenue. The form should be mailed in and a return address sticker attached to the rear of current driver's license. **The driver could be fined \$15.**

Vehicle has only one number plate attached: All Colorado vehicles must have a license plate at-

tached to the rear and front bumper of the vehicle. **This can carry a fine of \$15.**

Number plates obstructed by distorted/colored/smoked/tinted/scratched/dirty device: Cannot have any license plate cover over either license plate. Commonly seen are tinted or scratched clear license plate covers. **Fine could be \$100 and 3 points.**

Failure to sign affirmation of Insurance: Law requires all to sign the rear of the registration which promises to maintain insurance on your vehicle. **Ticket can carry fine of \$15.**

Colorado Laws Passed in 2009

New Colorado Cycling Law
Senate Bill 148: Requires that drivers give cyclists at least 3 feet of space when passing or risk a \$110 ticket. Anyone who throws an object at a cyclist could be charged with a Class 2 misdemeanor, which carries a fine of between \$250 and \$1,000, and a possible sentence of three to 12 months in jail. **Effect August 5, 2009.**

Cell Phone Prohibitions for drivers
House Bill 1094: Prohibits drivers under the age of eighteen years from using wireless telephone for talking, listening, or texting while driving a motor vehicle. It also prohibits drivers eighteen and older from using a wireless telephone for texting or other manual data entry or transmission while driving a motor vehicle. The violation is a class A traffic infraction. There is an emergency exception to this law if the driver has reason to need to contact public safety personnel during an emergency. **Effective date is December 1, 2009.**

Cars Stopping for School Buses

House Bill 1236: Requires a driver stop for a school bus at least twenty feet before reaching the bus after the visual signal lights on the bus have been activated. It also requires a driver to stop for a school bus that is not equipped with visual signal lights when the bus stops to pick up or let off children. **Effect August 5, 2009.**

Low Power Self-Propelled Vehicles

House Bill 1026: Replaces several categories of self-propelled vehicles in Colorado law, including: "motor-driven cycle," "motor scooter," and "motorized bicycle," with the three new categories; "low-power scooter", "electrical assisted bicycle," and the "electrical personal assistive mobility device" (The Segway)

Minor drivers and passengers on a motorcycle or low-power scooter are required to wear a helmet. **Effective on October 1, 2009.**

Low-Speed Electric Self-Propelled Vehicles

Senate Bill 75: Eliminates the definition of "neighborhood electric vehicle" and replaces it with "low-speed electric vehicle." This is a vehicle that is self-propelled utilizing electricity as its primary propulsion method. The law permits vehicle to operate on roadways where the speed limit is 35 mph or less.

Regulates use of golf cars:

Prohibits an unlicensed driver of a golf car from carrying a passenger under the age of 21.

Prohibits anyone under the age of fourteen from operating the golf car.

Cannot operate the golf car on a state highway.
